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
# **Legislative Appreciation Food Truck Day**


# Serendipity Sneak Peek at the Mississippi Museum of Art

This year, the Mississippi Museum of Art (MMA) hosted a Serendipity Sneak Peek. The Serendipity exhibit opened on Thursday, June 6th, with a special reception for the artists. Artists arrived at the museum and were greeted with an impressive display of their artwork. Each piece was hung and identified by a museum label that included the artist's name, name of the piece, materials of the work, and a quote from the artist.

walk-throughs, and handle any issues that may arise.


