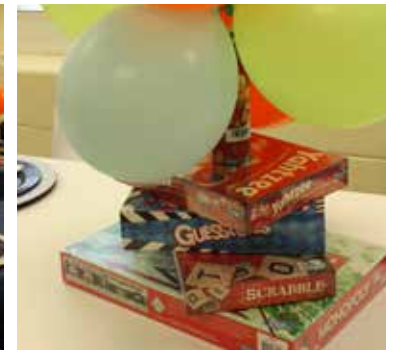

March Was Social Work Month

At Mississippi State Hospital (MSH), social workers are more than care providers—they are advocates, leaders, and difference makers. Every day, these dedicated professionals embody the theme of “Social Work = Compassion + Action” by meeting the needs of patients with empathy, persistence, and an unwavering commitment to serve.

In recognition of Social Work Month, we celebrate the contributions of the MSH social work teams across the hospital’s diverse programs and services. From acute care to long-term treatment, from the courtroom to the community, social workers at MSH play an integral role in improving lives and advancing hope.

Continued Treatment Services: Compassion Sustained Over Time

In Continued Treatment Services (CTS), social workers serve some of the hospital’s most complex long-term patients. Their work extends beyond the hospital walls, as they help patients prepare for reintegration into the community while also enhancing daily life on the units. Whether coordinating social outings, facilitating family connections, or planning discharge resources, these social workers bring enthusiasm and creativity to their roles. They are known for organizing memorable celebrations, from Thanksgiving feasts to Christmas pajama parties, creating moments of joy and normalcy for patients.

Female and Male Receiving: Compassion in Action at Every Step

In both Female Receiving and Male Receiving, social workers are the first point of contact for patients navigating hospitalization. Their responsibilities are as varied as they are challenging—assisting with benefits screenings, coordinating family communications, securing appropriate placements, and managing the complex paperwork required for discharge. Their work demands persistence, adaptability, and compassion as they advocate for safe and supportive discharge plans.

As one staff member put it: “Ask any of our patients who they would like to talk to first, and the answer is ‘my social worker’—because they make things happen.”

Jaquith Nursing Home: Compassionate Care for Long-Term Residents

At Jaquith Nursing Home (JNH), social workers support residents, families, and loved ones in navigating the challenges of long-term care. Their work centers on enhancing quality of life, advocating for residents’ needs, facilitating communication with families, and addressing psychosocial issues that arise with aging and disability. By bringing compassion to each interaction, they ensure that residents feel valued, heard, and supported.

As Mercedes Ramsey shared, “We strive each day to make a difference, to shed light on why compassion and empathy make a difference in the world.”

Oak Circle Center: Advocacy for Young Patients

At Oak Circle Center (OCC), the Social Services team provides vital support to young patients and their families throughout hospitalization and discharge. Their work involves coordination with child welfare agencies, courts, and community services, as well as facilitating psychoeducational groups and maintaining communication with families. Their advocacy ensures that each child's transition from hospital care is as smooth and supportive as possible.

Their dedication goes beyond discharge planning—they build relationships that empower patients with skills and support for life beyond hospitalization.

Substance Use Services: Building Hope in Recovery

In Substance Use Services (SUS), the social work team plays a transformative role in helping women overcome addiction and

build paths to lasting sobriety. Through advocacy, resource coordination, family support, and individualized discharge planning, they empower patients to reclaim their lives and look toward the future. The team fosters an environment of strength and hope, living out their motto: “Welcome to Sober Town, where sobriety is always in season! Every day is a sober day on 81.”

Forensic Services: Bridging Compassion and Justice

The Forensic Services Social Work Team serves at the intersection of mental health care and the criminal justice system, ensuring that individuals involved in legal proceedings receive fair, compassionate treatment. Through comprehensive assessments, treatment coordination, and advocacy, they balance legal requirements with patient care, fostering rehabilitation and protecting individual rights. Their work supports both patients and public safety, making an impact across the state.

Social Services Administration: Leadership Behind the Scenes

At the heart of MSH's social work operations is the Social Services Administration

Team, led by Director Elaine Sendelweck, LMSW, and Assistant Director Rhonda Bufkin, LMSW. This team ensures that every moving part of social services stays in motion. From benefits coordination to housing referrals and legal processing, their work ensures that patients receive seamless, comprehensive support from hospitalization through discharge and beyond.

Their leadership and dedication keep the department running smoothly, bridging the gap between hospital care and life beyond the hospital walls.

Here, the students had the privilege of hearing from several key leaders and professionals, including Carla Dearman, Director of Support Services; Amy Carruth, Director of Service Outcome; Angela Howell, Director of Nursing; Dr. Robert Maddux, Physician Supervisor; and Dr. Reb McMichael, Psychiatry Team Lead. These professionals provided an overview of their respective roles, discussed the importance of interdisciplinary teamwork in patient care, and encouraged students to consider careers in behavioral health services.

Ms. Sorena Vinson, Health Science teacher at Brandon High School, expressed her appreciation for the annual partnership with MSH. "I enjoy bringing my Health Science students to MSH every year due to the history of the hospital, the

employability possibilities for their future, the education on mental health, and seeing the beauty of the campus," she said. "The museum is so interesting for my students. And Ms. Brown is the best historian for the campus!"

Ms. Brown also reflected on the significance of hosting the students each year. "It's always a special day when the students from BHS visit," she said. "We hope to instill in them a love for the hospital, our beautiful campus, and our patients. We hope that these tours will lead them to consider MSH when it comes time for them to begin their careers."
