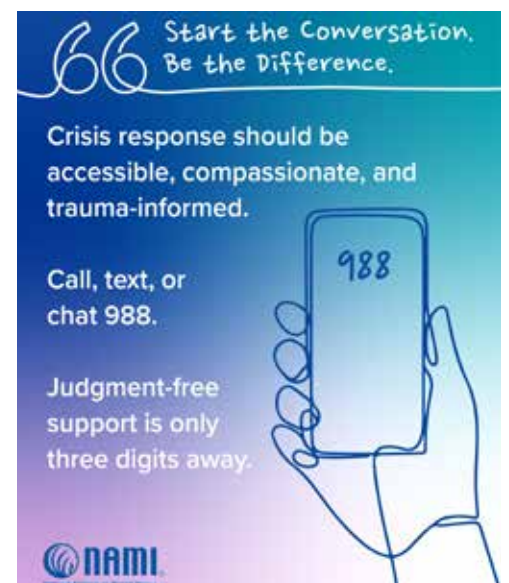

Friends Of MSH Annual Meeting Honors Community Partners

Friends of Mississippi State Hospital, Inc. held its 2025 Annual Meeting on Wednesday, August 20, in the Building 71 Conference Center. The afternoon gathering brought together board members, volunteers, community partners, and hospital staff to celebrate the impact of service and to recognize those who make a difference in the lives of patients and residents.

Friends President Amy Walker opened the meeting with a warm welcome, followed by an invocation led by board member Gale Martin and the Pledge of Allegiance led by Treasurer Dee Payne. MSH Director James G. "Bo" Chastain then directed the awards presentation, honoring three organizations whose generosity and commitment have enriched the MSH community.



NANCY B. FOREMAN AWARD

In 1987, Ms. Foreman was one of seven people to sign the charter to establish the Friends organization. She served as President from 1989 to 1993 and remained an active Board member until her death. She traveled, at her own expense, throughout the state educating the public about mental illness and served as a tireless advocate for Mississippi State Hospital. Her grassroots efforts also included advocacy with the legislature. Ms. Foreman inspired her family, friends, and community and continually

encouraged them to volunteer at MSH. Her daughter, Anne, followed her as President of Friends from 1993 to 1995.

In honor of Ms. Foreman, and in appreciation of her dedication and service to this organization, the Friends of MSH established the Nancy B. Foreman Award. This award is given each year to an individual or group who has demonstrated through their service, their commitment to enhancing the quality of life for persons with mental illness.

VIVIAN SHIVERS AWARD

The Helping Hands Award was established in 2006 to honor an individual or group who represents the volunteer spirit and sets the standard for future generations. In 2009, the Friends Board voted unanimously to rename this award in honor of Ms. Vivian Shivers.

Ms. Shivers began her career as an RN at MSH in 1976 in one of the original tuberculosis wards, and later served in Jaquith Nursing Home. After retirement in 1987, Ms. Shivers

In addition to her service at MSH, Ms. Shivers was a loved and respected member of her community and church in Magee, MS.

JERALD D. BALL TOGETHER WE MAKE A DIFFERENCE AWARD

This award recognizes businesses or organizations in the community who have given exemplary service to Mississippi State Hospital. In 2018 the board voted to rename this award in honor of Mr. Jerald D. Ball.

Mr. Ball began his career at MSH in 1984 when he became Director of the Volunteer Services Department. He immediately developed a plan to recruit and retain volunteers. His primary areas of concern were adequate clothing, and making sure patients were not forgotten during the Christmas holiday season. The clothing center established by Mr. Ball continues

to provide needed clothing to patients and residents throughout the year. For the holidays he established The Christmas House and party program.

Donations to the Christmas House are used to fill Christmas bags for patients, and on “Santa Day”, business leaders, legislators, and others dress as Santa Claus and personally deliver the bags to every individual served by the hospital. Mr. Ball also sowed the seeds for the Friends of Mississippi State Hospital organization and was a charter member in 1987. This coming year, Friends will provide more than \$27,000 for projects. After retirement in 2005 he remained an avid supporter and volunteer at MSH until his death in 2018. His programs will continue to reap dividends for our patients and residents well into the future. Mr. Jerald Ball exemplified the spirit of volunteer service and spent his professional and personal life promoting and nurturing that spirit in others.

Historic Photo Presented To Mr. Chastain

A remarkable piece of Mississippi's mental health history has found a new home at Mississippi State Hospital thanks to the generosity of a thoughtful visitor and the support of Friends of MSH, Inc. The photo, dating to sometime between 1930 and 1935, features the staff of the Mississippi State Asylum which once stood where the University of Mississippi Medical Center is located today. Exceptionally well preserved and clear for its age, the image offers a rare glimpse into the early era of institutional mental health care in the state.

"I get excited about it," said Donna Brown, MSH Historian. "The picture is so good for that time period. We can see the details of their faces. We can touch that picture and feel that time period and those who were working at the hospital. That someone back then cared enough about people living with mental illness and decided they wanted to take care of them – it's powerful."

The photo was brought to MSH by Bob Whitten, a Louisiana resident who stopped at the hospital's front gate after



discovering the photo while cleaning out his late grandfather's storage room. His grandfather had worked at the State Hospital as a dentist many years ago. Wanting to ensure the photo was preserved and appreciated, Mr. Whitten offered it to the hospital. Ms. Brown met with him and brought the photo to the Public Relations Department's archives and history office in Building 71.

Understanding the historical and personal significance of the photo, Friends of MSH,

Inc. generously had it professionally framed for Mr. James G. "Bo" Chastain, MSH Director, who is known for his deep appreciation of history. While the original photo will remain preserved in the dark room of the archives, Mr. Chastain's copy is now displayed in Building 21. This unique artifact now stands as a reminder of the compassionate foundations of mental health care in Mississippi and the ongoing commitment of MSH to preserve and honor that legacy.

By statute, the nine-member board is composed of a physician, a psychiatrist, a clinical psychologist, a social worker with experience in the field of mental health, and one citizen representative from each of Mississippi's five congressional districts (as existed in 1974).

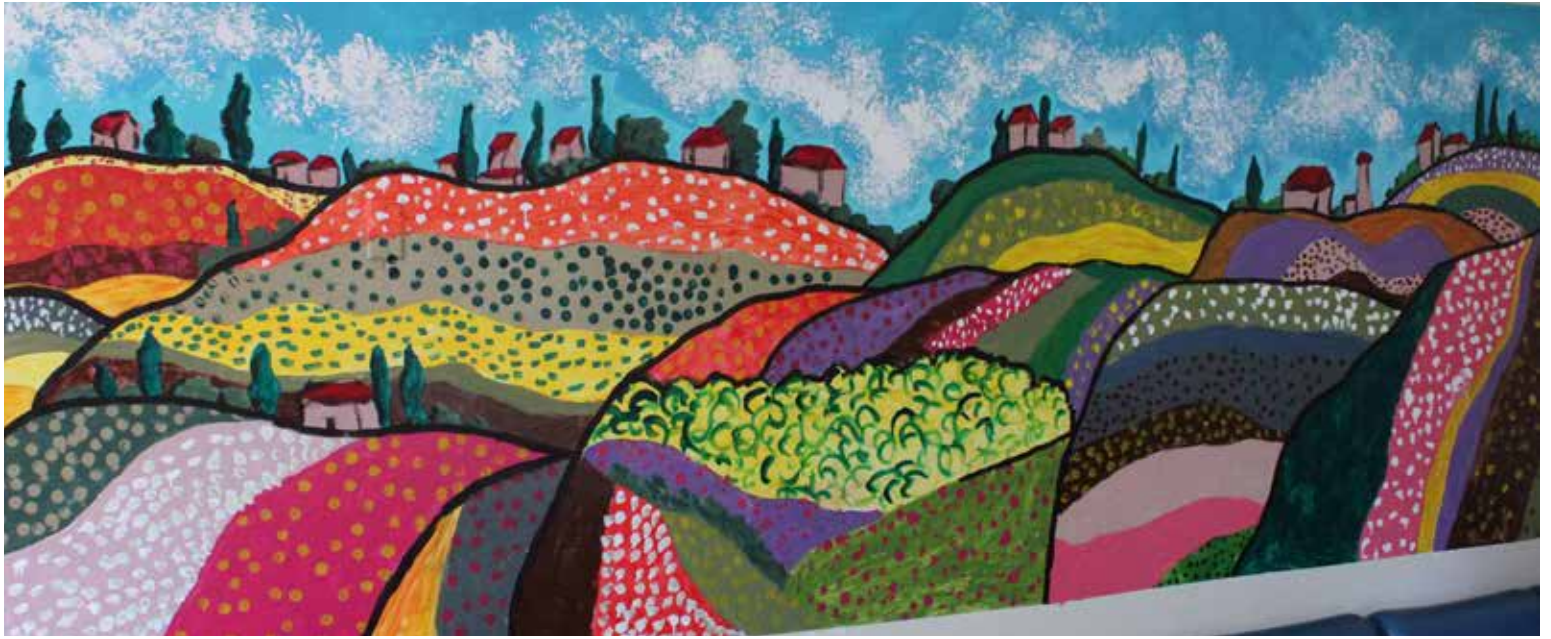

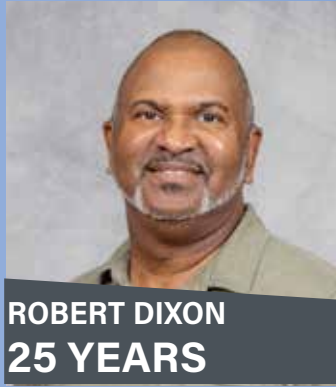
