The Mississippi State Hospital Art Services Program offers structured art classes for adolescents of Oak Circle Center, individuals served in adult psychiatric and substance use services, and residents of Jaquith Nursing Home.

Classes may be individual or group sessions and are designed to meet a wide range of therapeutic needs, as well as to increase competency in self-expression, visual communication, creative processes and cognitive understanding of art materials and methods.

OCTOBER 01, 1989

The first MSH art exhibit began as a gallery sale at the Mississippi Museum of Art. The show was called "A First Look". The second exhibit in 1990 was named "A Second Look" followed by "Look Again" in 1991. After deciding to continue the exhibit as an annual event an official name was needed. After a long meeting with much debate on names, a participant commented how serendipitous her visit to MSH was and "Serendipity" was • born.



SEPTEMBER 01, 1994

The art program continued to grow and Serendipity garnered more attention than ever during it's 5th Anniversary show. Following the annual event, a joint exhibit with South Mississippi Regional Center was hosted on the Mississippi Gulf Coast. The Art Who

> Gallery in Ocean Springs featured works from MSH including 75 pieces of artwork and 20 pieces of ceramics. Earlier in the year , Wyatt Waters, a nationally recognized watercolor artist from Clinton, provided a hands-on art session for MSH patients.

2005 - Hurricane Katrina's arrival postponed the 2005 Serendipity Art Show to September 29. One of the artists, a Biloxi native, completed this piece prior to landfall featuring Katrina as the saxophone player blowing the wind and water onto the coast. It sold for \$700. BankPlus matched that bid with donated funds to relief efforts on the coast.



SEPTEMBER 03, 2009

Dogwood Festival Belk in Flowood celebrated the 20th Anniversary of Serendipity with a preview exhibit during the month of August. The 2009 show featured 300 pieces of work by 150 artists from MSH.

SERENDIPITY



2020 - The COVID 19 Pandemic brought the world to a halt and prevented in-person events. However, it didn't stop Serendipity - we went virtual! An online walk-through art gallery allowed the artists to view their work framed and professionally hung. In lieu of the artists reception, goodie bags and treats were delivered. We also learned the power of the internet. The virtual show garnered more than 2900 views, far more than the average of 400-600 in-person visitors previously. Bids came from family members that had been unable to attend before due to the distance, and from people around the country including Florida, Louisiana, Texas, and New York. There were 104 pieces in the show. The highest grossing piece was "First Breath of Spring", an acrylic painting going for \$375.
